Among them there was a certain amount of drinking and a certain amount of lurid pictures on their walls. I didnot have a great deal of contact with those fellows who did that. But I think one thing that crystalized it--

Oh yes, first Dr. Machen was invited to preach in the First Presbyterian Church of Princeton, as supply preacher, and he preached some very strong sermons on the rise of modernism. Out in Los Angeles we read in the newspaper how Henry VanDyke stalked out of the meeting and said that what Machen was giving was a billious travesty of the Gospel. Things were getting sort of tense there when I went there. I got there, and we ~~maxx~~ had the Inagural address -- Incidentally the ~~faculty~~ faculty later on told me, they were all upset because they said Dr. Stevenson picked the speakers in all the main occasions and they said the ~~faculty~~ faculty was teaching one thing through the year, and then they had the speakers who took a different tack altogether! No direct clash, but it undermined it. But the Opening Address was given by Dr. Zwemer, the veteran missionary from the Moslem lands. I thought Dr. Zwemer gave a very fine presentation of a great many central Christian truths. He stressed the great evangelical message and witness and all that.
