But if you are going to try to represent the Lord in any kind of place where people expect you to have a certain dignity, you can't just change overnight. <sup>all your habits.</sup> Therefore it would be a very wise thing for people to try to get habits in seminary that they can keep up in the Lord's work later on. I've always felt it would be a fine thing if the students would think of themselves as training for a future profession in which they have to have certain habits. It's a lot easier to try to have those habits now. But I've never seen any success in 40 years so I've rather lost hopes of ever accomplishing much in that regard. But we had one fellow who was one of the slippiest fellows in seminary for his first two years here. He always looked, his clothes just looked sloppy. That's all. He never had anything but a shirt. No tie. Looked very sloppy always. He got a church out in Western Pennsylvania that Mr. Harding recommended him to, and the elders of the church suggested they give some money to Biblical and he told them that he questioned whether it was wise because Biblical didn't have a dress code! I've been told that he has since mellowed somewhat, in his attitude.

There was one fellow a graduate of Bob Jones who they say was a very excellent preacher. I never heard him preach. They said he was an excellent preacher. He came from a very very strict fundamentalist group in Ohio. He came from the leading church of this group and when he had been here a year he became quite disgusted we were not out knowing modernism all the time.
