

attempt to get control of our government and of all our denominations. What he has done in those things. And on the other hand the way that he has gotten into a position where people are either 100% for him or 100% against him.

The people who are for him, most (perhaps most is too strong) but a great many become disillusioned by this dominant insistence on his own way. So as one man~~x~~ said to me 10 years ago when I mentioned some very fine men who was a new supporter of Dr. McIntire of whom he hadn't heard before, he said, It's wonderful he's getting these new people all the time because he's always losing the people who have been supporting him!

There is a life which could have accomplished a tremendous lot for the Lord's service. A life which has accomplished a great deal. How much is going to last, I don't know. To me it is very sad to see all that energy, all that effort extended and so much of it for right causes but I just don't see what's going to happen when he's gone.

I was talking the other day to a man who has supported him very strongly, and does right to the present, and I said, what is going to be left of all the things he has started when he is gone. He said, The Lord will raise up another leader. The Lord can raise up another leader, but my observation is that unless a man is succeeded by a man who has worked with him and has much the same ideas, if the Lord raises up another leader, there is a big turnover and change and most of the work you might say has to be started from scratch. That is a sad thing.

Now of course I when I was in college became very much aware of the subtleness of modernism and of the real hatred that so many people had toward Christianity, toward evangelical Christianity. In the early days you used to see that in the papers. If they said something about McIntire they said the "ultra-fundamentalist" or something like that. It always has to be a term they make into a term of derision in some way.

This attitude toward the gospel. I don't say that's the whole cause of the attack upon him of course, but it enters into it, and is a thing I was very conscious of in those days that in standing for Christianity we are facing a real struggle. A Satan moves enemies of the gospel to a real hatred of it.

When I was a student at Princeton there was a group of students that were very much against the attitude held by Dr. Machen. I remember that when they announced that the Vice Pres. of the Board of Directors, and he was one of the Board of Directors at that time was strongly in favor of continuing the testimony of the seminary in standing behind Wilson and Machen--the Board was. The majority of the Board of Trustees was the other way, and they combined the two in such a way as to give them a majority! When it was announced that Dr. McEwen, pastor of the church in Pittsburgh, who was VP of the Board was going to speak in chapel the next day--- and incidentally on Sundays there the chapel service --many of the students were away preaching, and some would come to the chapel service there; some would go to one of the various churches
