Because it seems to me there are about as many definitions of those terms as there are people who use them. And I think they give more light than heat!

Neher: You mean more heat than light!

Right! Absolutely! It's easy to say the exact opposite of what you mean.

I've been thinking a little more about this matter of Dr. McIntire's attitude. It might be noticed that the attitudes that became more pronounced in him in more recent years, I began to realize soon after we started Faith Seminary. I had not realized them much before that. After we started, then when we began making our plans, I, of course, had great ideals as to what I wanted the seminary to be, and I had definite ideas on a great many things that I had developed during the 8 years of my previous experience in connection with seminary administration and teaching.

There were a few points - I don't remember what they were-- but a few points that I thought quite important as we drew up our statement of principles and purposes that he immediately ruled out, which rather irritated me. And I don't remember what they were now. I'm not sure whether they were important or not, but I know once or twice I was quite irritated, and then I remember praying as we were praying together saying, Lord if this is the institution only lasts this one year, we still are very thankful for what we've been able to accomplish in a year and for the influence we've been able to have. during this one year.

I've had that attitude ever since, in everything I've been connected with. Nobody knows the future. But I believe that if Biblical were to stop this summer, I believe what's been accomplished in these 8 yeras. has been worth every bit of effort. But I had those disappointments that first year.

Then, Oh, just one little point. A very little point, and yet it gives an indication of what might be ahead. That first yr. he said to me, We don't want a president, we don't want a president. He said, You'll be chairman of the faculty." I think he was president of the Board and I was chairman of the faculty.
