

However, they had a meeting of the ICC, I believe, in Cape May and Waite went down with his whole family in a trailer and got into the camp there a short distance from the Admiral, and started distributing literature to show how he was right and McIntire was wrong. Waite was then in charge of Audio-Visual program for the ACCC. There was a break between McIntire and the ACCC.

Neher: About what year was this?

1968. My sympathies were entirely with Waite at that point. But Waite began a big program -- campaign of vilification against McIntire which I thought was entirely wrong. He got a tape telling about the time of the ACCC meeting in California when McIntire tried to take it over. He told about it and he had the tape of what they would say, and he would say McIntire burbeled on and McIntire went on this way and that way. I was very disappointed he would take such an attitude. My previous sympathies for him largely disapated because of the way he reacted on that.

Then he had his beg campaign about the KJ which you would think a man of his amount of education would have sense enough to know better than to do. I got a note from him about a year after we came up here -- just a sheet that said "from the desk of D.A. Waite" and said, Would -- I understand you had some difficulties with Dr. McIntire. Would you mind telling me how you came to leave him? I wrote him a few non-committal lines. I didn't want him to use me to critisize McIntire, etc. That's the last contact I had with him.

He was in charge of the audio-visual work for the ACCC and I wasn't closely associated with what went on then, and after a couple of years he was out of that. He'd not been connected with them any more as far as I know. I don't know what appened there.

I have the feeling there is a man with a lot of ability, a lot of education that is off the track. There is doubtless some good things in what he puts out, and some real sensible criticism of some of the wicked things in the world. But I don't think his approach is the right approach, and I feel very sorry about that.

This sort of thing to call me heretical for taking the view that Chas. Hodge makes is certainly going beyond common sense. In a situation like that often the best thing to do is just to ignore it. Perhaps that was the thing I was foolish about through the years. I had my difficulties with Dr. McIntire and I would write him a letter when I would feel he was getting off on some taagent that I felt was unfortunate, I'd write him a letter about it and I'm sure they had quite an influence on him and in keeping him from certain unfortunate positions that he tended to slip into. I had personal experiences with him as one will have with any human being. But he with his ability and tremendous force they are apt to be multiplied a bit,
