

issues and on most of the ecclesiastical matters, though we had always put our emphasis on the basic task that we thought the seminary should accomplish. This student succeeded in persuading the president of the Board that the institution<sup>tion</sup> needed drastic change, and the <sup>l</sup>atter ordered the Board to retire me and turn over the direction of the school to himself. It became obvious that very soon most of the faculty whom I had selected and trained through the years would be dropped and replaced by others with entirely different attitudes. The Board proceeded to retire me, while raising my ongoing salary \$2000 a year, but depriving me of any effective voice in the conduct of the institution.

I knew that this would mean the death of Faith Seminary as far as the objectives were concerned that I had emphasized during my 34 years of leadership. Much as I would have liked to retire from active teaching and administration so as to devote myself to putting the results of my many years of study into proper written form, I felt that this would mean betrayal of all that I had stood for and the real end of the institution to which I had devoted so much of my life.

Dr. John W. Murray, the well-known <sup>ev</sup>angelist, who had been a member of the first class to go through the entire theological course at Faith, recognized these facts and agreed to join me in establishing a new institution that would carry on the identical witness and activity that I had developed during so many years at Faith. When I spoke about this to other faculty members I found that practically every one of them agreed exactly <sup>with</sup> ~~with~~ my analysis of the situation. As a result almost all of them came to Hatfield, Pennsylvania, and became part of the original faculty of Biblical Theological Seminary.
