

to you that you will get it. If you put less than four you won't. On the other hand I used to say, "I don't care how bright you are; if you put less than four hours a day on it you may get a smattering of it and be able to show up well in class but it won't stick with you. With less than four hours a day you simply won't learn it." My students used to put that much time on it and all of them got it. I remember one time, when I was urging that more Hebrew be required for graduations than had previously been the case, Dr. Machen said, "I don't know about requiring more Hebrew; I fear that if we do ~~w~~ that they might not learn any Greek." I would rarely flunk a student. At least I did not flunk any student who really worked. I made them work very hard and I got them all through. Dr. Stonehouse I believe, set rather high standards for his courses but it was ~~and~~ and if a student did not meet it he failed him, so he often failed students whereas for me they worked many more hours than for him and most of them passed. I believe he had one second-year class with only four students, and he failed three of them at one time. Anyway, that is aside from the present matter. Carl did excellent work in Hebrew. I speedily recognized he was a very good student and we became ~~and~~ and we used sometimes to go for walks together and got to know each other fairly well. I was unmarried during those years and generally ate my meals with the students in the ~~xxx~~ student dining room. McIntire ate there also and we often talked together. After two years he graduated and I remember how nervous and upset he was as he considered ~~xxxxxx~~ various propositions as to what he would do the next year. I used to go down there to visit him and occasionally to preach in his church.
