One of those men who had been just a roustabout fellow not doing anything worthwhile, he came forward in one of my evangelistic meetings and it just completely changed his life. He said that he went over to Africa and became a great missionary and established many churches there. The other one, he said, his whole life was transformed at one of my evangelistic meetings and he went into the Australian parliament and eventually became a great leader for social improvement in Australia. I said to him would you mind telling me what you were preaching when you influenced these two men. Well, he said, the first one who went as a missionary to Africa, he said, I was preaching the old fashioned gospel. I was preaching salvation through Christ and the absolute inerrancy of Scripture. But when I was converted, he said, I went off into the mountains for 6 weeks and took with me only the Bible and Dr. Torrey's book on leading souls to Christ, and he said for years I preached that gospel and believed every word of it. He said that's what I was preaching when this ~~xxx~~ man was converted. Now, he said, when the other man was converted who went into social work I was preaching the same gospel ~~butt~~ but he said my mind was already
