

rapidly from one to the other. Such a course would be very difficult to follow and would not be especially interesting. Where there are interrelations we are apt to touch upon them in both of our accounts, or to make them a transition.

It is similar with the interpretation of predictions. We are apt to deal with ~~the~~^a subject in the present and then take up consideration of the same subject in the future, making certain predictions in relation to it. Then we are apt to return to the discussion of another subject in the present, and then to relate that in the future which it is related to it. Or we may take three or four different subjects and deal with each of them in the future in a logical, rather than necessarily a chronological, arrangement.
