"It is very likely that in the earliest period a person might find asylum at any sanctuary, any altar serving for this purpose, and Exod. 21.13 and 1 Kg. 1.50; 2.28-34 may imply this. The six cities eventually selected as places for asylum were perhaps originally all significant sanctuary centers."
