

nation that God selected as His instrument, through which to give His revelation and to bring His Son into the world; yet the account of Israel in the Bible hides nothing of the apostasy and sin which made it necessary for God to bring sweeping punishment upon the nation. The objectivity of the pictures in the Bible can not be duplicated elsewhere.

Another remarkable feature of the Bible is its most important picture - the picture of the Lord Jesus Christ. No other like Him has ever lived. No other like Him has even been imagined. Here is one who is thoroughly human. As we read it we see that He is a man, a true man, a man in every detail, one who has all the marks of humanity. There is nothing stilted or artificial about Him. Yet as we read we see a marvelous perfection of character. The picture of Christ contained in God's Word is absolutely unparalleled. As we read it we see the truth of the statement with which the book of Hebrews begins: "God, who at sundry times and in divers manners spake in times past unto the fathers by the prophets, Hath in these last days spoken unto us by His Son."

We have only time to glance at one other internal evidence - the relation of the Bible to the increase of scientific knowledge.
