And so you ~~to get~~ a ^{philosophy} good ~~g~~ teacher for a Christian school is very , very difficult. He either has his own ideas apart from the Bible which ~~he~~ is trying to enthuse every body ~~about~~ about, and I think that is very dangerous, because in the next generation a better thinker comes along with a different philosophy which may be just as close to the Bible or closer than the one he was presenting or else/~~its~~-pretty negative and its ~~free~~ pretty hard to get a man who cares to give his life studying ^{his own} the ~~same~~ subject from a purely negative viewpoint. But when I say that Habakkuk is one of the most philosophical of the books of the Bible, I mean that he is looking ~~to~~ at things and questioning , How are we to understand this? and what does this mean? and ~~he~~ represents true philosophy because he finds his answer , ~~new-~~ not in a human gathering together of things, but in ~~g~~ what God has to say about it. Well, the book of Habakkuk is devoted, quite a ~~la~~ large part of it, to denunciation of sin and of wickedness, and this is something which most human philosophy ignores or leaves out. I'm afraid we Christians in interpreting the books of the Bible pass over ~~re~~ rapidly the denunciation of sin and wickedness and to deal with the wonderful passages of hope and blessing that we have. Well, those are so marvelous we cannot understand them too well. In my ~~at~~ own discussions here I have been passing over these denunciations of wickedness as I've been trying to get the ~~time~~ time to explain clearly to you these wonderful passages of hope and yet we need to get the Bible in its proportion, to see the tremendous stress in the Bible of ~~he~~ the denunciation upon wickedness and upon sin, because
